

Child Protection and Mandatory Reporting

AUTHORITY: CEO

RESPONSIBILITY: All persons, businesses and/or organisations engaged with LCIS in any capacity

PURPOSE AND SCOPE

Laverton Community Integrated Services Inc. (LCIS) is committed to promoting and protecting the interests and safety of children. We have zero tolerance for child abuse.

All children, regardless of their gender, race, religious beliefs, age, disability, sexual orientation, or family or social background, have equal rights to protection from abuse

LCIS supports and respects all children, staff and volunteers. LCIS is committed to the cultural safety of Aboriginal children, and those from culturally and/or linguistically diverse backgrounds, and to providing a safe environment for children living with a disability.

If any person believes a child is in immediate risk of abuse, telephone 000.

All staff, Board members, volunteers, students, contractors, participants at LCIS are responsible for the care and protection of children and reporting information about child abuse.

Further to this all staff, Board members, volunteers, students, contractors, participants at LCIS commit to;

- 1. To facilitate the prevention of child abuse occurring within LCIS
- 2. To work towards an organisational culture of child safety.
- 3. To prevent child abuse within LCIS
- 4. To ensure that all parties are aware of their responsibilities for identifying possible occasions for child abuse and for establishing controls and procedures for preventing such abuse and/or detecting such abuse when it occurs.
- 5. To provide guidance to staff/volunteers/contractors as to action that should be taken where they suspect any abuse within or outside of the organisation.
- 6. To provide a clear statement to staff/volunteers/contractors forbidding any such abuse.
- 7. To provide assurance that all suspected abuse will be reported and fully investigated.

LCIS has and maintains a Child Safety Statement that is displayed publicly.

Our commitment to child safety and wellbeing

All persons engaged by LCIS, all our partners current and future, are bound by the following;

'We value children and young people by making a commitment to child safety, child wellbeing and cultural safety. We embed this as part of our governance and daily practices.

Children and young people have the right to feel safe, respected and their voices heard. We involve them in making decisions, especially about matters that directly affect them'

This statement is intended to empower children who are vital and active participants in our organisation.

Reporting Child Abuse

What is reportable?

Outcomes or actions from which children are in need of protection include neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse, emotional maltreatment and exposure to family violence. These are all reportable offences.

What are reasonable grounds?

You do not need to have proof to report any concerns you have about the safety of a child under 17. Indicators that represent reasonable grounds to report a suspected offence include:

- a child or young person discloses that he or she has suffered or is suffering non accidental physical injury or sexual abuse
- someone else advises you that a child or young person has been sexually abused or non-accidentally injured, or
- your own observations of the child or young person's physical condition or behaviours lead you to reasonably suspect that the child or young person has suffered or is suffering non-accidental physical injury or sexual abuse.

The Department of Human Services Child Protection in conjunction with the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development have also provided a step-by-step guide to making a report. See APPENDIX 1

Can anyone report concerns for the safety of a child or young person?

ANY person who believes, on reasonable grounds, that a child is in need of protection may voluntarily report to Child Protection Services.

- You do not need to prove that abuse or neglect has taken place. You only need reasonable grounds for your belief.
- You do not need permission from parents or caregivers to make a report; nor do they need to be informed that
 a report is being made.
- If you made a report in good faith, you cannot be held legally liable- regardless of the outcome of the report.
- Your identity will remain confidential unless you need to give evidence if the matter goes to court. It is rare that this happens

What is mandatory reporting and who is mandated to report suspected abuse?

Mandatory reporting describes the legal obligation of certain professionals and community members in Victoria to report incidences of child sexual abuse and/or child physical abuse. These people are called mandated reporters; if a mandated reporter believes on reasonable grounds that a child has suffered or is likely to suffer significant harm as a result of physical injury or sexual abuse then they have a legal obligation to report. All persons who are engaged with LCIS are mandatory reporters.

Section 182 (1) of the Children, Youth and Families Act 2005(as amended in 2011) lists the following people as mandated to report:

- registered medical practitioner
- nurse
- midwife
- person who is registered as a teacher under the Education and Training Reform Act 2006 or has been granted permission to teach under the Act
- the principal of a Government school or non-Government school within the meaning of the Education and Training Reform Act 2006
- member of the police force

Failure to Disclose

The Failure to Disclose offence was introduced in 2014. The law maintains that reporting child sexual abuse is a community-wide responsibility; there is now a criminal offence in Victoria that imposes a clear legal duty upon all adults to report information about child sexual abuse to police.

Any adult who forms a reasonable belief that a sexual offence has been committed by an adult against a child under 16 has an obligation to report that information to police.

Who to report to and how

If you need to report an offence that requires immediate police attention, please call Victoria Police: 000

If you suspect on reasonable grounds that a child is suffering abuse or neglect or you wish to discuss your concerns about a child or young person, you should telephone:

Child Protection Crisis Line: 131 278. This is an emergency service after-hours line. Opening hours: 5pm- 9am, Monday- Friday. During Saturday, Sunday and public holidays the line is open 24 hours.

National Child Abuse Helpline: 1800 99 10 99. This helpline operates Monday to Friday, 9am-5pm AEST.

Legislative requirements

All LCIS staff, volunteers and workplace students are mandatory reporters and will comply with their legal responsibilities. This is a condition of employment/engagement, they are trained and supported to do so.

- Failure to disclose: Reporting child sexual abuse is a community wide responsibility. All adults in Victoria who have a reasonable belief that and adult has committed a sexual offense against a child under 16 have an obligation to report that information to the police.
- Failure to protect: People of authority in our organisation will be committing an offence if they know of a substantial risk of child sexual abuse and have the power or responsibility to reduce or remove the risk, but negligently fail to do so.

APPENDIX 1

A step-by-step guide to making a report to Child Protection or Child FIRST

Protective concerns

You are concerned about a child because you have:

- · received a disclosure from a child about abuse or neglect
- observed indicators of abuse or neglect
- been made aware of possible harm via your involvement in the community external to your professional role.

At all times remember to:

- record your observations
- · follow appropriate protocols
- · consult notes and records
- · consult with appropriate colleagues if necessary
- consult with other support agencies if necessary
